

2024 Budget at a Glance

The city's budget intends to be a financial plan that prioritizes high quality services in a fiscally responsible manner. The process to develop the budget is a collaborative effort of the city budget team, the finance committee of the council, and the management team. Careful planning and preparation ensure our CORE Values guide the way. The 2024 city budget is \$48.8 million.

The 2024 Property Tax Levy is \$18.6 million

The property tax levy is the primary funding source for services such as police protection, fire protection, and parks and recreation. In 2024, the city levy is proposed to increase 7.34 percent. A homeowner with median value home (\$312,900) will see an estimated annual property tax increase of \$106, or \$8.83 per month, from the city's portion of property taxes.

*The City Council approved a 2024 HEDRA Special Levy subject to the limit of 0.185 percent of the taxable market value. This levy is used for economic development activities that help grow key areas of the city such as the Vermillion Corridor, downtown and the Industrial Park.

**The City's debt supports assets such as the Aquatic Center, Riverfront Renaissance, street infrastructure, fire trucks and other similar items.
