Several lending and other programs may be used by qualifying property owners. The HRA residential rehabilitation programs are available for historic properties provided the project also meets HRA locan criteria.

- 1. Owner-Occupied Loans (includes historic residential improvements; Resources recipients must meet income guidelines). Inventory (1993-present).
- 2. Commercial Rehabilitation Program (includes interest reduction, rehabilitation loan, and exterior improvement programs).

3. This Old House Program (ends in 2002) Deferment of real estate tax increases for rehabilitation of houses more than 45 years old. Call the Dakota County Assessors Office at (651) 438-4200 for more information.

Historic Tax Credits for Certified Rehabilitation

This program applies to income-producing properties listed on the National Register, including houses converted to bed and breakfasts and many types of downtown commercial buildings. Twenty percent of the investment in a rehabilitation meeting the u.S. Secretary of the Interior's Standards can be certified as a federal income tax credit.
