FORESTRY

- In July 2019, our City Forester Paul Mahoney retired after 41 years of service.
- 5 Swamp White Oak trees planted at City Hall after removal of Linden trees.
- 13 new Oak and Elm trees planted at Lions Park.
- Residents informed of tree trimming through placement of door knockers in January.
- City staff treated 54 public ash trees for Emerald Ash Borer in June and July.
- Rainbow Tree Care treated 447+ private ash trees for Emerald Ash Borer this season.
- Planned and implemented tree planting for replacement trees and new tree sites.
- Attached water bags for newly planted trees.
- Throughout the year our City Forester takes phone calls from residents and inspects trees for diseases or other issues.
- City Forester attends the State Shade Tree program and partakes in the International Society of Arboriculture and Minnesota Society of Arboriculture through seminars and programs for continuing education within the forestry profession.

FORESTRY

- Arbor Day was held on Friday, April 19th at Riverwood Park.
- 44 volunteers helped plant, mulch and water trees.
- Mayor Mary read the Arbor Day Proclamation
- Catholic United Financial, Modern Woodsman of America, Hoffman & McNamara
 Nursery and Landscape and Dakota Electric Association provided trees and monetary donations to make the event possible.
- Tree City USA status awarded by the National Arbor Day Foundation for 23 years.

PARKS AND TRAILS

- An entrance gate was added to the small dog area, for users to bypass the large dog area.
- A maintenance gate was added to the east side of the Tennis Courts after a vehicle crash. The new addition is more functional to use when hauling equipment.
- The Parks crew and Arena staff remove turf on the East rink in October and then install turf again in March for rentals.
- 7 new memorial benches and 1 swinging bench was installed.
- Hanging baskets were placed along the pathway at along the Mississippi River Trail near Levee Park.
- 50 hours of clean-up was needed along the Mississippi river this year due to flooding.
- 200,000 square feet of sod at the Veterans Athletic Complex were vandalized this spring and a donation was given to fix damage for users to continue play on the soccer fields.
- 200 yards of mulch was added to the playgrounds for annual upkeep.
- Locks of loves on the vermillion river bridge have grown from 130 two years ago to nearly 450 this year.
- General maintenance throughout the year includes:
 - Garbage collection 3 days a week, April through October at all parks. Collection on weekends at high use parks and shelter reservations.
 - Veteran's Athletic Complex maintenance: including dragging, and chalking of fields May through September, three to five times a week depending on usage.
 - 30+ miles of trails maintained: including snowplowing, trimming of trees and general upkeep.
 - Two 16-foot mowers mowed 5 days a week totaling 400+ acres of turf.
 - Two small 5-foot mowers mowed 5 days a week.
 - Machinery maintenance done in house as needed.
 - o 8 recreational and hockey rinks flooded as needed, December through February.
 - Maintenance of pool throughout the season; opening and closing procedures.
 - o 80+ hours of service provided annually in support of Rivertown Days.



2019 Highlights

Annual Safety Camp

- 55 youth participated in the Annual Safety Camp, Wednesday, June 19th
- Camp included: Fire Safety, bike safety, K-9 demo, outdoor safety, personal safety, and Electrical safety.
- Partners included: Hastings Fire, Hasting Police, YMCA, Community Education, Dakota Electric Association, and National Karate.

Annual Community Halloween Party

- 1,175+ youth and adults attended at the Annual Halloween Party, Friday, October 25th
- 59 Volunteers contributed their time, including the Youth Impact Council group and Student Impact Middle School group.
- \$1,840 in monetary donations from 20 Hastings businesses and organizations.
- Teran Harmon State Farm Agency donated 60 pizzas and two staff for the event.
- 1,070 pounds of food collected and donated for Hastings Family Service.
- \$413 collected for the YIC Scholarship
- The Party included carnival style games, candy, pizza, lemonade, a haunted hallway, cookie decorating, batting station, Gaga Pit, and live interviews. Partners included: YMCA, Community Education, HCTV, Coborn's, Hastings Hawks, Carpenter Nature Center, Parks and Recreation Committee, elected officials, Promise Fellows, Student Impact and Youth Impact Council.



Spring Events

- Alternative Spring Break
 - 43 teens registered for Alternative Spring Break March 11 14th at the Hastings Middle School. Service projects and field trips are planned for the week. This program is in partnership with the YMCA and Community Ed.
- Story Walk
 - In celebration of Earth Day, a self-guided story walk was set-up along the Mississippi River Trail from Levee Park to Jaycee Park, Friday, April 29-Sunday, April 22nd. 100+ estimated in participation.
 - o In partnership with Dakota County Pleasant Hill Library and free to the public.
- Birding Day Festival
 - 75+ attended the festival on Saturday, April 20th. To celebrate earth day and Hastings as a 'Bird City USA' Carpenter St. Croix Valley Nature Center hosts the Annual Birding Day Festival. The City of Hastings helps promote, program and attend the event.
 - Various activities, a youth competition and field trips are coordinated.
- Parks and Trails Clean Up
 - 143 volunteers participated on Saturday, May 4th at Vermillion Falls. Groups were provided with refreshments and a safety talk and then went to assigned parks for clean-up. 21 of 37 parks were cleaned and the additional parks have been cared for by Adopt a Park groups.

RECYCLING

- Recycling Program Efforts
 - Organics Pilot Program collection at Hastings City Hall as a part of the new Hauler Contract with Tennis Sanitation 2019-2021. Staff monitor 95-gallon cart and Tennis Contracts through Highland Sanitation for pick up once a week.
 Coordination of employee education, materials purchasing and bin placement along with best management practices have been followed throughout the year.
 - Staff applied for a Green Corps Member through the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency in March and was interviewed and selected as a host site September 2019-August 2020. GreenCorps member, Lindsay Anderson will focus on waste reduction at events and through educational activities.
 - Staff Implemented the required activities in partnership with Dakota County Environmental Department as a part of City Recycling Coordinator role and Local Solid Waste Staff.
 - Placement of bins in City Parks, following recycling best management practices were inventoried and recorded on the Municipal Tracking Tool developed by Dakota County.
 - Bi-monthly posts on social media platforms were created and posted following County Standardized messaging.
 - Articles in Quarterly Rivertown Newsletters distributed to 11,000 Hastings Residents.
 - Organics collection at the Hastings Civic Arena for the past five years, which was implemented originally through a Dakota County Grant. Collection is on an oncall basis.
 - Seven 66 Quart Bins full of CFL light bulbs were collected from resident drop-off bin at City Hall.
 - 53 lbs. of Holiday lights collected from resident drop-off bin at City Hall, 254 lbs.
 at Terry's Hardware and 211 at Sterling Drug Store, in partnership with ProAct.
 - Organization of volunteers at Community events to educate public on recycling efforts in Parks and Public Spaces.
 - 880 lbs. of recycling collected at Levee Park and Jaycee Park throughout the festival and 4,480 lbs. of trash

- 10,939 Solid Waste Guides sent to Hastings Residents in partnership with Tennis Sanitation.
- 740 Gallons of oil and 360 yards of construction debris and 1,061 yards of compost collected at Seasonal Drop-Off site provided by Tennis Sanitation in Coaches parking lot in Hastings.

Youth Green Teams

- 105.59 tons of mixed-paper collected (January September) at the drop-off box located at Terry's Hardware. This service has been available since 2002.
- o Youth Green Teams include local groups that apply with Tennis to share profit.
